I enjoy walking to St Joseph, Edgecliff on evenings that I am celebrating mass. I find walking helpful. I can pray, continue my reflection on scripture readings for the day, prepare an introduction and a brief homily. I can relax on the way back to Paddington, thinking of people and events of the day. Occasionally parishioners or others exchange greetings with me, or make small talks, or we simply acknowledge each other's presence, while walking. Often I wonder and pray, what can I or we as parishes offer people in Edgecliff and Paddington. What do God want of us in 2021?

Every parish is different and I have come to appreciate that even within a parish the dynamic changes over time. Change in society impacts human behaviour and relationships, and faith community experience the ripple effect as well. Social and cultural aspects of parish life change every few years. With rapid change in society there is a growing need to learn how to engage the changing reality and adapt our practices. There is no one single effective programme, but in all initiatives what is common is the many generous and kind people who are involved. The hidden, discreet people who go about doing good without attracting any attention. St Joseph reminds us of those who play a role in the salvation of others. As an intercessor, a support and a faithful companion in times of trouble. Joseph is referred to as being a righteous man in Matthew 1:19, "and the Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her publicity, ..."

This quality of St Joseph can be experienced in all walks of life. We encounter men and women, who touch lives and change others for good. The gift of oneself can never be undermined, it transcends sacrifice and points to God. Think of mentors, bosses, priests, religious, uncles and aunts, teachers, neighbours and parishioners who enrich our spirituality and lives. For now, let us focus on our renewal. After Easter let us pray while walking, shopping or enjoying coffee in a café. Discerning and listening to the Spirit and to one another. I am planning to consult and meet with individuals and groups and begin a process to identify areas to focus on in 2021-2022. 

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

WHAT COMES FROM WITHIN

At his death, Moses was praised because 'never since has there arisen a prophet in Israel like Moses, whom the LORD knew face to face' (Deuteronomy 34:10). He was the mediator between the people of Israel and the living God. They could not bear to be in God's presence for long at Horeb and so they had begged him to be the one to represent them and bring God's message back to them in ways they could understand. Today's first reading reminds the reader that Moses' mission was only the beginning of a larger mission that would be completed in the future. In the meantime, the people would have to wait for the promised prophet.

When Jesus began his ministry, his exorcisms, healing and teaching led his contemporaries to recognise his authority. The word for authority is ἐξουσία and it is a beautiful way of describing what others could see coming out of his very being. While Moses knew God face to face, it is clear that Jesus has something more because it comes from within. The demons have insight that we need to make our own – this is more than a prophet, this is the Holy One of God.

Paul continues his advice to the Corinthians reminding them we need to do more than simply proclaim that Jesus is the Holy One of God. Our proclamation is a great start, but it must be lived out in our daily lives. We are called to find the right balance between the attention we give to the Lord and our family commitments.



An unmarried man can devote himself to the Lord's affairs, all he need worry about is pleasing the Lord; but a married man has to bother about the world's affairs and devote himself to pleasing his wife: he is torn two ways. In the same way an unmarried woman, like a young girl, can devote herself to the Lord's affairs; all she need worry about is being holy in body and spirit. The married woman, on the other hand, has to worry about the world's affairs and devote herself to pleasing her husband. I say this only to help you, not to put a halter round your necks, but simply to make sure that everything is as it should be, and that you give your undivided attention to the Lord.
