Joy, Serenity and Peace in the Lord

It has been a year since I started ministry here. It has been an interesting year; St Francis Church was struck by lightning late last year, the challenge continues with the pandemic, Fr Francisco returning to Singapore early next year, Fr Joseph and I have to reorganise things again. Dealing with internet issues at this time of year is frustrating and I wonder what else Lord!
In the first reading from Zephaniah, four verbs call for rejoicing: "Shout for joy! Sing Joyfully! Be glad and exult with all your heart!" Salvation and joy are synonymous. The coming of the Messiah promises liberation from the power of evil. The messianic age evokes freedom and joy, freeing people from serving the sentence placed by sin. The prophecy tells that God is in our midst, renewing people by his Love. We rejoice not in things but in people. A person can bring joy by what she/he brings or does, or when we share in another's joy. We rejoice in Jesus the source of all good, through union with Christ, we are assured that no exterior tribulation or challenge can hold back joy. Joy guards us from anxiety. Many in the contemporary world suffer anxiety which leads to feelings of abandonment by God and are misunderstood or let down by others. Surrendering to God and trusting in God's providence bring interior peace. It transforms a person and stops her/him from hurting or blaming others. This is not resignation to fate but active faith engagement with God. We bring our concerns and thanksgiving to God in prayer. When we put into practice what we learn from Jesus, things will change. I wish things could be different, but I know issues can be addressed. When resolved, it will give me a sense of achievement. To minister, to preach, to listen, to be present and to celebrate with others, these give me joy! I hope you too can take time to reflect and pray.
Do not allow inconveniences to lead you to suffer anxiety. God gives true peace and God is with us.

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

PREPARE WELL

All of us have been involved at one time or another with preparing to meet a special guest. It is often a time of mixed emotions as excitement and joy vie with some measure of anxiety about the quality of our preparations.

As Paul's Christians at Philippi waited for the return of the Lord, he knew that it could be for many a time of anxiety; would they find acceptance on his return? Would they find a place in his kingdom?

It was a time of trepidation because it was feared that he would return unexpectedly, like a thief in the night (1 Thessalonians 5:2), and find them unprepared. In the face of such anxiety, Paul encourages them to put their trust in the Lord who loves them. Even now they are called to experience the Lord's peace and joy as they wait for his return. Especially, they are called to pray with confidence and trust.

John the Baptist knew that the Messiah was soon to be among us, and we see how he calls those who listen to his message to prepare by taking a hard look at themselves and how they live. In order to be ready when the Messiah comes he calls for a concern for others that expresses itself in generosity, fairness, and compassion.

As we prepare for the Lord's coming among us, today's readings call us to make ready with the confidence of Zephaniah, the peacefulness of Paul, and the justice and compassion of John the Baptist.
